VISIT HISTORY

The Danville Area Chamber of Commerce

This year the Danville Chamber of Commerce celebrated its Diamond anniversary with a gala dinner. The history of chambers is a long one – for example, a Chamber of Commerce organized the Boston Tea Party in 1773. Chambers are membership organizations which support healthy business communities and lobby for local, state and national policies which meet their goals and support their areas.

In the San Ramon Valley there have been several Chambers and sometimes Merchant Associations, Booster Clubs and Improvement Clubs with similar goals. Currently there are Chambers in Alamo, Danville Area and San Ramon and. in the past, a San Ramon Valley Chamber. All of them had boards which decided what issues to promote, from better transportation to a responsible regulatory environment to civic celebrations.

The current Danville Area Chamber counts its beginnings from its creation by a Boosters organization. This was reported in the October 28, 1948, Valley Pioneer. New businesses were opening with many advertisements in the popular weekly newspaper. Here are a few: P&X grocery store, Jo Ell Shop (clothing), Olivia's Variety Shop, Cook's Coffee Shop and Fountain, Danville Appliance Corp., Village Theater (movies), and Geldermann Realtors.

By January 1949 the Danville Chamber of Commerce was organized, had hired a secretary and was looking for a downtown office. William Cooke was elected President with a board making decisions. By February they had an office in the Shell Service Station building on the northeast corner of Diablo Road and Hartz (today's Primo's).

Next to be reported was their first annual membership drive. The article reporting the drive gives a flavor of the time:

Green Hearts Appear on Danville Streets

Today the Danville Chamber of Commerce begins its first membership drive. The Green Hearts will be in evidence on the streets of Danville and the hapless business man who isn't wearing one will be projected by high pressure from all sides until he digs down, forks over, and joins up.


What a busy couple of years ensued. The Chamber worked successfully to get bus service from Walnut Creek to Danville, tried to get telephone rates lowered, addressed dead-end streets and spoke up on the sewer pipe issue (to connect with Central Sanitary or create a new district).

In March they had their first annual Chamber dinner at Diablo Country Club which was covered in the Pioneer and described as a "glittering event." And in September a large headline touted the Chamber's prize-winning entry in the Walnut Festival parade, a "bevy of beauties" on a float.

We should wish Chamber members a happy 75th when we see them.

There has been a transformation in the Freight Room of the Museum featuring some of the wild life that existed during the times of California's First Peoples. The East Bay Regional Park District has offered to us a loan of some of their animals. They have been placed artfully around the room. Half the fun is spotting them.

The Freight Room exhibits the First Peoples of California and is the classroom for the First Peoples Program open to 4th grade classes during October and November. The children have been wide eyed seeing this array of wild life. It reminds them of the natural habitat of our earliest inhabitants and illustrates our teaching about food, hunting, trapping, clothing, and material resources.

Gorgeous Indian Baskets at the Museum

This is the season to visit the Museum and view some examples of Indian-created baskets. Californian basket weavers are renowned for their baskets. During the First Peoples exhibit, Indian basket collector extraordinaire Don Phelps has loaned the Museum some of his baskets and memorabilia. The feathered baskets can take your breathe away.

In addition, two new baskets will be displayed as long term loans from the East Bay Regional Park District. One is a central valley Yokuts tribe cooking basket and the second is a tiny Pomo-styled gift basket topped with quail top-knot feathers.
